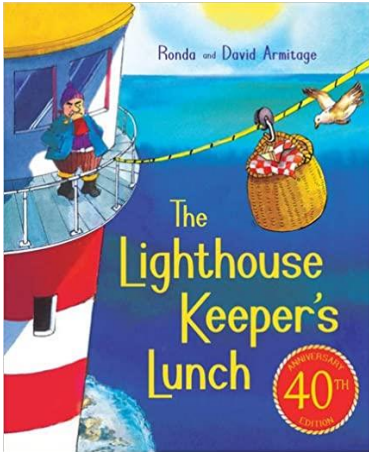

**The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch – Ronda and David Armitage**

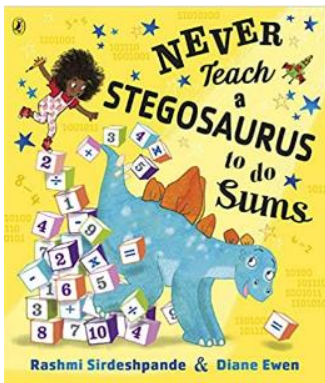
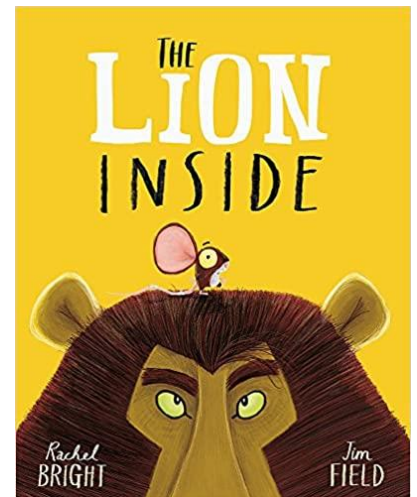

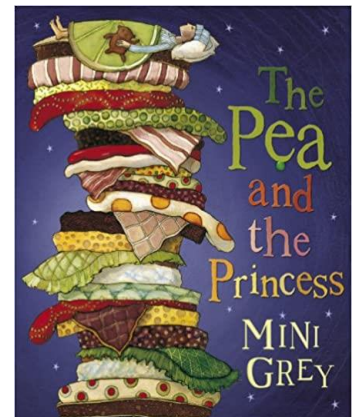
This is a great book to read out loud with your family - can you find your roar?
