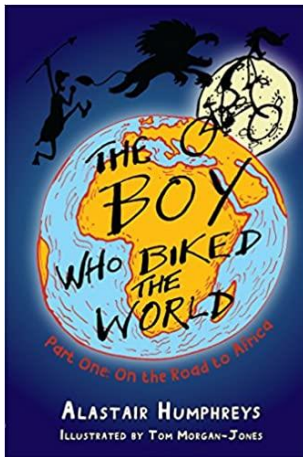

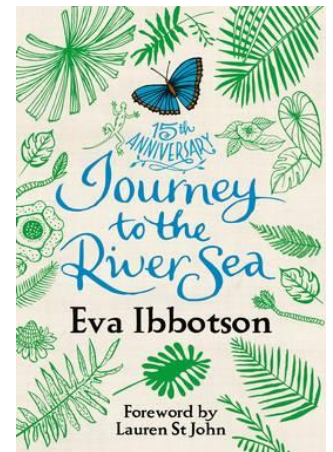


The Boy Who Biked the World Part One: On the Road to Africa – Alastair Humphreys
