Pupil Premium Reporting to Parents

Principles

At High Wycombe Church of England Primary School:

- we ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all of the pupils.
- we ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed
- In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged
- We also recognise that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. We reserve the right to allocate the Pupil Premium funding to support any pupil or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged.
- Pupil premium funding will be allocated following a needs analysis which will identify priority classes, groups or individuals. Limited funding and resources means that not all children receiving free school meals will be in receipt of pupil premium interventions at one time.

Provision

The range of provision the school may consider include:

- Providing small group work with an experienced teacher focussed on overcoming gaps in learning
- 1:1 support
- additional teaching and learning opportunities provided through trained TAs or external agencies
- acquiring effective materials aimed at raising standards, particularly in reading and mathematics.
- All our work through the pupil premium will be aimed at accelerating progress moving children to at least age related expectations. Initially this will be in Literacy and Maths
- Pupil premium resources may also be used to target able children on FSM to achieve L3 at the end of KS1 or L5 at the end of KS2
- The school will publish information on how they have used their Pupil Premium Grant to address the issue of 'narrowing the gap', for socially disadvantaged pupils.
- Supporting payments for school trips

Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) Allocation for 2014/15 is: £28,500

We have targeted the PPG to:

- A) 1:1 teaching to provide support for KS2 pupils to enable 65% to reach level L4+ in Reading, Writing and Maths
- B) 1:1 teaching to provide support for 80% KS2 pupils to make at least expected progress (12 points) between KS1 and KS2
- C) Provide support in KS1 pupils to enable 100% to reach level L2+ in Reading, 60% Writing and 100% Maths
- D) Provide support in KS1 for KS1 pupils to make the expected progress (9 points) across KS1 making 60% in Reading, 60% Writing and 100% Maths
- E) To provide financial support to attend school trips and other school activities

The impact of the PPG for 2014/15 was:

- a) The 1:1 provision was delivered and planned by teachers which resulted in our targeted KS2 pupils achieving:
 - R/W/M – L4+ = 67%
 - Reading –L4+= 83%
 - Writing - L4+= 67%
 - Maths - L4+= 83%
- b) Progress between KS1 and 2 for our targetted KS2 pupils was:
 - R/W/M – 12pts+ = 67%
 - Reading –12pts+ = 60% and 40% significantly above expected progress
 - Writing - 12pts+ = 80% and 20% significantly above expected progress
 - Maths - 12pts+ = 80% and 20% significantly above expected progress
- c) The KS1 support was planned by teachers and delivered by teachers and learning support assistants (LSA's) which resulted in our targeted KS1 pupils achieving:
 - Reading –L2+= 100%
 - Writing – L2+= 50%
 - Maths – L2+= 100%
- d) Progress between EYFS and KS1 for our targetted KS2 pupils was:
 - Reading –9pts+ = 100% and 25% making better than expected progress
 - Writing - 9pts+ = 50% and 25% making better than expected progress
 - Maths - 9pts+ = 100% and 100% making better than expected progress
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- e) The school was able to support children so that they could attend class based trips throughout the year as well as attend the residential outdoor pursuits trip in the summer term.
