Pupil Premium Reporting to Parents

Principles

At High Wycombe Church of England Primary School:

- we ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all of the pupils.
- we ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed
- In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged
- We also recognise that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. We reserve the right to allocate the Pupil Premium funding to support any pupil or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged.
- Pupil premium funding will be allocated following a needs analysis which will identify priority classes, groups or individuals. Limited funding and resources means that not all children receiving free school meals will be in receipt of pupil premium interventions at one time.

Provision

The range of provision the school may consider include:

- Providing small group work with an experienced teacher focussed on overcoming gaps in learning
- 1:1 support
- additional teaching and learning opportunities provided through trained TAs or external agencies
- acquiring effective materials aimed at raising standards, particularly in reading and mathematics.
- All our work through the pupil premium will be aimed at accelerating progress moving children to at least age related expectations. Initially this will be in Literacy and Maths
- Pupil premium resources may also be used to target able children on FSM to achieve L3 at the end of KS1 or L5 at the end of KS2
- The school will publish information on how they have used their Pupil Premium Grant to address the issue of 'narrowing the gap', for socially disadvantaged pupils.
- Supporting payments for school trips

Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) Allocation for 2013/14 was: £21,600

The PPG allocation for 2013/2014 was targeted to:

- a. 1:1 teaching to provide support for KS2 pupils to enable a greater percentage to reach level 4 in Reading, Writing and Maths
- b. 1:1 teaching to provide support for KS2 pupils to make the expected progress between KS1 and KS2
- c. Provide support in KS1 to close the gap between target and on-track children
- d. Target a higher % of children achieving Level 3 by the end of KS1
- e. To support school trips

The impact of the PPG for 2013/14 was:

- a) The 1:1 provision was delivered and planned by teachers which resulted in Standards in writing being above the national average in the 2013 and reading and mathematics were in line with 2013 national average.
Higher attaining pupils did well in 2014 with approximately 1/3 achieving level 5 in all three subjects areas.
- b) Progress across KS2 was strong last year with at least 90% making at least expected progress in reading, writing and mathematics which was above the 2013 National average in all three areas.
- c) Standards at the end of KS1 rose in 2014 and are close to the national average. The overall APS as well as that in reading and writing improved in 2014 from the 2103 figures.
- d) At the end of KS1 improvement was also seen for the schools most able pupils particularly in reading which shows an improving three year trend at Level 3.
- e) The school was able to support children so that they could attend class based trips throughout the year as well as attend the residential outdoor pursuits trip in the summer term.
